

SCOUT CAMP STAFF REPORTS FOR DUTY

Men Are Due at Big Tract in Southern
End of County To-Day.

C. M. Helstand Will Be in Charge of
Program There, and Will Be
Aided by a Group of Com-
petent Leaders.

At twelve o'clock to-day every member of the staff which will be in charge of the Boy Scout camp, located on the banks of the picturesque Octorara Creek, in Southern Chester county and Northern Cecil county, during the coming summer, was supposed to register and thus show his readiness to begin the work for the next eight weeks.

The staff is made up of competent men, the majority of whom have had experience in boys' camps in previous years. Several of the men have been with the Scout camp in former years.

According to the list furnished by C. M. Helstand, Director of the camp, the staff includes the following men:

Joseph H. Brinton, graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, and for five years a member of the camp staff. Mr. Brinton, who holds one of the Harmon Foundation Eagle Scout Scholarships, will serve as assistant camp director and camp adjutant.

J. G. Starr, Coach of Athletics at the Littitz High School, near Lancaster, will be in charge of the water program, which includes swimming and life-saving. Mr. Starr is a former camp director, and well acquainted with the work of big camps.

M. L. Selbert, a graduate of Carnegie Tech., will be in charge of activities and handicraft. He is a former Scout and has been at the camp for two seasons.

D. B. Helstand, a student at Elizabethtown College, and a former Scout, will act as Quartermaster and Stewart at the camp. This will be Helstand's second summer in the camp.

Paul Schraer, a senior in the Medical School at the University of Pennsylvania, will be in charge of the medical headquarters. Schraer was a former Scout and understands the general program as carried on at the camp.

C. C. Schmidt, a member of the Downingtown High School faculty, who has seen three years of active camp life, will be in charge of one of the older boys' unit.

Elwood C. Stabley, member of the Unionville Joint Consolidated School faculty, will also be in charge of one of the older boys' unit. This will be Stabley's second summer at the camp. Both Stabley and Schmidt are experienced Scoutmasters.

YOUNGER BOYS' GROUP.

Donald G. Hughes, recently elected Principal of the Green Tree School, will direct one of the younger boys' units at the camp. This will make the second season for him.

Cecil H. Good, Principal of the Caln Consolidated School, at Thorndale, will also direct one of the younger boys' units. He and Hughes are experienced Scoutmasters, each having a Troop in this county.

The camp for part-time boys, that is those boys who will find it impossible to spend a whole period at the camp, will be directed by John Wink, a Harvard University student, and for some time an experienced Scout worker.

THE CAMP ENGINEER.

C. C. Cole, who kept the camp in A-1 condition throughout the winter, will be on hand during the summer as camp engineer.

Wallace Stephens and two assistants will be in charge of that necessary department known as the commissary department. The cooks are from Baltimore.
